

ECONOMIC IMPACT

In 2007, the Institute for Non-Profits conducted a survey of the county's not-for-profit businesses to determine their direct and indirect economic impact on the community. The survey included 208 Rockland-based organizations, not including houses of worship, libraries, foundations or colleges. Based on the 66 responses, Cornell University researchers extrapolated the following information:

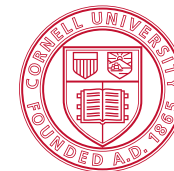
